Dear Sir

I have finally found leisure to set about the report and propose first to draw up a full history of the case from the commencement to the present time in the following manner, and then to give the experiments.

Case

There is San Martin, a Canadian Truckman in the employ of the American Fur Company of good constitution, robust and healthy was accidentally wounded on the Island of Mackinaw by the discharge of a musket on the 6. of June 1822.

I have given the case as reported in the Medical Recorder, commencing with the second paragraph "the charge, consisting of powder and duck shot, &c and ending with the last paragraph but two "and the food and drinks continually exuded, unless prevented by the plug, compress or bandage" This last paragraph leaves the case at the 6th of June 1823 and in September 1824, the time of the report, the orifice appears to be still open. Now in order to connect this with the written account, commencing with the words, "a valvular formation of the coils of the stomach" so adapted itself to the orifice as completely to prevent the efflux of the gastric contents" &c &c I want you to take up

the history from the 6th of June 1823 up to the time the
vase was formed, so as to close the orifice; stating the
time and manner in which it formed itself, — as far as
you recollect. I then proposed to go on with the written history
to the end; and finally I proposed that by way of closing the
case you should take the history up from April 1823 when
he entered your service as stated in the last paragraph
but one in the Recorder commencing after this manner "By
April 1823 he was so far recovered as to enter my service as
a private Servant" &c &c and then go on to give me a short & summary
way, a history of him up to this time, his journeys, employments,
marriage &c &c. I wish to close the case in this way in
order to remove entirely the misunderstanding that exists, — especially in Europe, as to the state of his health, and to
show that the experiments that immediately follow are
made on the stomach and fluids of a perfectly healthy
man. With these two additions we shall have the means
of giving a full and satisfactory account of the subject.
