Dear Doctor,

Forgive me for all the
situation & obloquy your splenetic dispo-
sition has heaped upon me, in consideration
of the kindness you have done me, by making
me acquainted with a very clever fellow,

I delivered your letter to your cousin, and
had a long talk with him, and I was infinitely
pleased with him, and if the truth must be
told, he is the only full grown Beaufront, of
the masculine gender, with which it has been
my fortune to become acquainted, that is worthy
of any decent man's notice. - I expected to
find him a little shiveled up, dark, designing,
crooked looking fellow, very much like
yourself, from your description of him; but
instead of that, I found him quite a good looking
man, which is certainly very remarkable, con-
sidering his name. - You slandered him vilely,
in your description of him, which, by the way,

to a man acquainted with your character, does not appear at all singular, but this we can settle at another time.

You ask if I have "soaped the old snow & little saw": as if you thought I had taken you for a guide, & had soap enough to spare, after ~~bothering~~ ~~myself~~ enough to make me go down sick.
