CIRCULAR.

THE Medical Faculty of the State University would most respectfully announce to the profession that their organization for the ensuing year is now completed, and they are enabled to present a faculty as complete for the purposes of teaching as any school in the Union. That the student may enjoy tuition on the various departments to the fullest extent, the chair of Materia Medica, Physiology, and Medical Botany, occupied by Prof. BARRETT, who voluntarily resigned, because of an impaired condition of voice rendering his utterance painful and difficult, has been divided, and the department of Materia Medica, Therapeutics, and Medical Botany, in future, is to be occupied by Prof. JOHN BARNES, who justly sustained a high position in medicine for many years—was Professor of Obstetrics in the Jefferson Medical College, at Philadelphia, and who subsequently practised medicine in the South, where he enjoyed to a high degree, the confidence of his profession.

The Chair of Physiology and Comparative Anatomy is occupied by Prof. PAYTON SPENCE, one of the distinguished Alumni of the University. The faculty think that in making the selection they have acted wisely, preferring to encourage the talent of their own, rather than that of other institutions—believing the Chairs will be ably filled.

The Chairs of Anatomy and Surgery, so long occupied by Prof. McDOWELL, are, in the present arrangement separated, and the Anatomical Chair will be filled by Prof. JOHN T.

HODGEN, recommended by Prof. McDOWELL. It is believed that the Chair could not be more ably filled than by its present occupant.

The Chair of Obstetrics and Diseases of Women and Children will be occupied by Prof. B. T. KAVANAUGH, who is familiarly known over the West as an agreeable, forcible, and eloquent speaker, as eminently a practical man, and an efficient teacher.

The Chair of Pathology and Clinical Medicine in future will be occupied by Prof. DEMING, who has for many years been one of the lights and ornaments of the profession in the West — has occupied a Chair in two of the Medical Schools of Indiana, and is known at home and abroad to teach this, his favorite department, with great force and ability.

Thus, this branch of the University presents to the profession a faculty more complete and better adapted to the wants of the school than heretofore, and feel more confident of success.

The aim has been to combine talent and acquirement with industry — to unite efficient men, who would teach eminently Southern and Western medicine; and that they have succeeded, the sequel will show.

PRACTICAL ANATOMY.

THE Dissecting Rooms are under the charge of the Professor and Demonstrator of Anatomy.

Nothing will be wanting to the Medical Student, either in the supply of material for dissection, or in attention on the part of the Demonstrator, in enabling him to prosecute his labors with every advantage.

The facilities for obtaining subjects in this city, have rendered the supply of material heretofore even more than sufficient, and consequently it has been afforded to the classes at a more moderate charge than in most of the schools of our country.

Students arrange themselves into classes of from four to eight persons; and they are numbered in the order in which their classes are presented to the Demonstrator—the class first formed being entitled to the first subject, and so on, until all of the classes are supplied. Every student can thus have the opportunity of using the scalpel to the full extent of his wishes.

The Demonstrator of Anatomy will be in constant attendance to give instruction as to the manner of dissection, and to explain to the class relative and special Anatomy.

Whenever an important organ is to be demonstrated—as the Brain, Heart, Liver, &c.—notice is previously given to the whole class.

These demonstrations are usually conducted in the Amphitheatre, as by this arrangement each student is made acquainted not only with the parts he himself has traced out, but also with those which he has not, as yet, attempted to dissect.

COLLEGE EDIFICE.

THE building is now complete, and the various Lecture Rooms are as ample as any school in the Union. The front is 200 feet—depth, 80 feet—height, three stories.

HOSPITALS.

THE students of this Institution have access to the Hospital and Dispensary, without charge, all the year, and either the Professor of Clinical Medicine and Pathology, or the Professor of Surgery, are in constant attendance.

In addition to this privilege, Prof. McDOWELL is the Physician and Surgeon of the Marine Hospital, by appointment, and the students will be at liberty to visit the patients at that Institution.

SURGICAL OPERATIONS.

No Medical School has enjoyed greater privileges in witnessing surgical operations than this. Most of the capital operations are performed in the Amphitheatre, before the students. The cases are mainly selected from the private practice of the Surgical Professor.

MUSEUM.

THE Museum for Anatomical illustrations is probably as ample as that of any school in the West or East, and in Comparative Anatomy and Natural History, not equalled by any connected with a Medical College in the United States.

STUDENTS IN ATTENDANCE.

THIS Institution was founded in the spring of 1840. Its first Lectures were given in '40-41, since which time the school has regularly advanced. Its greatest number of students—160, was in 1846. The cholera prevailing alarmingly in our city from 1849, and the emigration of many of the first course students to California, made the subsequent sessions somewhat smaller, but the average number in attendance every year, has not been less than 100 pupils.

REGULATIONS FOR THE TERMS OF LECTURES, &C.

REQUISITES FOR GRADUATION.

FOR the promotion of the cause of Medical Education, as well as for the usefulness of the Institution, the Faculty have determined that the regular session shall commence two weeks earlier than heretofore; and consequently, the ensuing Course of Lectures will begin on the sixteenth day of October, at which time, it is to be hoped most, if not all, of the class will be assembled.

From the first of October the Anatomical Rooms will be opened, and the Professor of Anatomy and Demonstrator will give their personal attention thereto; Clinical instruction will

be given at the Hospital, and preliminary Lectures will be delivered by the different professors at the College.

It is required of the Candidate for the Degree of Doctor of Medicine:

1. That he be of lawful age, and of good moral character.
 2. That he shall have attended two full courses of Lectures in some respectable Medical School, one of which shall have been in this College; and he must exhibit his tickets, or other adequate evidence thereof, to the Dean of the Faculty.
 3. The candidate must have studied Medicine for not less than three years, (the terms of attending Lectures being included in these,) under the direction of a respectable medical practitioner.
 4. A Practitioner of Medicine, in order to his becoming a Candidate, must exhibit testimony to the Faculty of his having been engaged in a reputable practice during the three years preceding his application; and he must, also, have attended one full course of lectures in this Institution.
 5. Candidates for Graduation must present to the Dean of the Faculty an acceptable thesis on some medical subject, correctly written, either in the English, Latin, or French language; and they must, also, exhibit to the Faculty, at their examinations, satisfactory evidences of their professional attainments.
 6. They must, also, notify the Dean, in writing, of their intention to become candidates by the first of February; their Thesis and Graduation Fee must be presented at that time, both of which shall be returned in case of withdrawal or rejection.
- Application for the *ad eundem* degree must be accompanied by written evidence, that the candidate is a graduate of an accredited School of Medicine; that he has been engaged, for the year preceding his application, in the Practice of Medicine; and, also, that he sustains a good moral character, and intends to devote his time wholly to the practice of his profession.

F E E S .

THE Fees for a full Course of Lectures amount to \$100.

The Fee for the Diploma is \$20 ; for admission to the Dissecting Room and Demonstrations, \$10 ; and Matriculation Fee \$5.

Should any student, or friend, desire further information in regard to the condition, regulations and terms of the School, he will please address the Dean of the Faculty, who will promptly give any desired information.

Comfortable boarding can be obtained within a short distance of the College, for from two to three dollars per week.
