ANNOUNCEMENT

1880-81.

The FORTIETH regular course of lectures in the Missouri Medical College will begin on Monday, the 4th day of October, 1880, and continue five months.

The Preliminary Course will begin on Monday, the 20th of September. This course will consist of didactic lectures on special subjects, and the regular clinics at the hospitals. It will be free to all, and students should avail themselves of the many advantages it affords.

The Spring and Summer Course will begin on the second Monday in March, 1881, and continue through April and May. This course will consist of clinics and didactic lectures.

Students taking these three courses will be enabled to pursue their studies through nearly nine consecutive months in the year. Attendance, only upon the regular course of five months is obligatory.

The Commencement for Conferring Degrees will be held early in March, 1881.

In making the present announcement, the Faculty are happy to inform the many friends of the School of a continued increase in the number of students in attendance.

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HOSPITALS

CONNECTED WITH THE

MISSOURI MEDICAL COLLEGE.

1. At St. John's Hospital during the greater portion of the past year the clinics held were supplied with a large number and rich variety of cases.

This hospital adjoins the College Building, and is in charge of the Order of "Sisters of Mercy," its medical management being exclusively controlled by the Faculty of the Missouri Medical College.

The hospital also contains private rooms, furnished, for "pay patients."

2. The St. Louis City Hospital is the largest hospital in the city. It contains four hundred and fifty beds, and is furnished with a commodious lecture and operating amphitheatre. The Missouri Medical College is represented in this institution by a complete corps of clinical teachers; and, inasmuch as it is the great receptacle for the pauper sick and injured of the city—several thousands being annually received into its wards and treated—the clinics held here are of the highest interest. The entire forenoon of every Monday and Thursday are devoted to them. The order of these clinics will be seen elsewhere.

This hospital is quite accessible from the neighborhood of the College, it being situated near a line of street cars, enabling students to reach it without unnecessary loss of time.

3. At the City Hospital a clinic will be held weekly, by Prof. Bauduy, at which the subject of Nervous Diseases will be practically illustrated.

4. The Faculty have exclusive Medical control of the following Children's Asylums:

St. Bridget's Asylum, corner Twenty-sixth street and Christy avenue.

St. Joseph's, corner Fifteenth street and Clark avenue; and

St. Mary's, corner Tenth and Biddle streets.

These institutions furnish our clinics with many cases illustrative of the Medical and Surgical diseases of children.

CLINICS.

The surgical clinic at the City Hospital, administered by Prof. A. P. Lankford, is always abundantly supplied with material, which, in course of the session, amply illustrates practical surgery. This clinic is given twice a week, and in addition to the great variety of surgical diseases, the student sees every form of wound, the results of accident, etc. Under the present excellent management, it is so arranged that the class not only see the application of dressings, reduction of fractures and dislocations, but witness the progress and results of various plans of treatment, thus enabling them to estimate the merits of each.

The surgical clinic at St. John's Hospital, under the control of Prof. T. F. Prewitt, has been thoroughly reorganized and is daily increasing in interest, in the number of cases available for clinical illustration, and in the number and variety of important operations performed. The presentation of cases of, and clinical lectures upon "Diseases of the Skin," in connection with the surgical clinic at this hospital, forms a feature of more than usual interest to students.

The medical clinic at St. John's Hospital is under the immediate charge of Dr. A. B. Shaw.

It is safe to say, also, that there are few forms of disease known to this latitude (and many peculiar to the tropics) that are not at some time during the course, exhibited at the medical clinics of Professor Robinson—these being abundantly supplied from the material in the wards of St. John's and the City Hospital.

Some idea of the magnitude of the clinics for diseases of women may be formed, when it is remembered that, in addition to the large number treated at St. John's, there is also maintained a regular clinic at the City Hospital, administered, part of the time, by Prof. Maughs, and part of the time by Prof. Papin. Such facts can leave little doubt that in this department our facilities are unsurpassed.

The Eye clinics of Prof. Michel are abundantly supplied at both hospitals, and a great many operations are performed, all of the most important being repeated during the course.

The clinics for diseases of the Ear and Throat are conducted by Prof. Todd, with the view to afford the class the greatest possible amount of practical information in those special departments.

Prof. Kingsley gives clinics upon diseases of children—a class of patients requiring particular methods of diagnosis and therapeutics.

It is apparent, then, from the number of available clinics, the abundance of material, and the prominence given to clinical lessons, that, without neglecting the usual didactic lectures, the course is eminently practical, the aim of the faculty being to prepare the student for the realities of his professional life; that he may leave his *alma mater*, not only well grounded in the principles of Medicine and Surgery, but that he may already have seen their practical applications, may have witnessed the originals of the pictures so well portrayed by the able writers, and may have acquired a practical knowledge of the application of instruments and the therapeutic effects of remedies.

We do not hesitate to affirm that by close application and regularity in attendance, the students may, with the advantages we offer, condense into the period of two or three years the ordinary experience acquired by a practice of twelve or fifteen, so that he will be prepared, at the very threshold of his medical career, for the serious duties and responsibilities of his calling.

PRACTICAL AND SURGICAL ANATOMY.

With a due appreciation of the importance of this fundamental branch of our science, the Professor of Anatomy will freely use specimens, charts, drawings, etc., to illustrate his lectures, thereby facilitating the understanding of the subject matter, and making the lectures at once more comprehensive and interesting.

"Human Anatomy" is a distinct branch of the general subject of Anatomy, and is studied in our schools, both independently, and in its relations to the collateral physical sciences. It will be the aim of the Professor of this department to combine in "Comparative Anatomy" (which includes every type of animal organization) as much as will aid in the better understanding of human anatomy, without rendering the subject more complicated.

The Faculty desire to impress upon the students, both Seniors and Juniors, that it is not optional with them what portion of their time they devote to this branch, but that it is expected that they will attend the dissections in this school as long as they may be students thereof.

The Legislature of the State of Missouri has passed an act legalizing dissections, and allowing Medical Colleges to obtain material from charity hospitals. Anatomical material, therefore, will be plentiful, and furnished to the student at a *nominal* figure. The main dissecting-room is a large, well-ventilated place, constructed with all modern improvements, and under the direct supervision of the Professor of Anatomy.

HISTOLOGY.

The method adopted in teaching this important study is so simplified that it becomes pleasant and interesting to all, and as easily understood as any other branch of medicine. To this end a complete series of photographic transparencies from the most perfect diagrams, together with a large number of micro-photographs of the various tissues and organs of the body, have, with much labor, been prepared by Professor Michel, which, when projected on the screen from a lantern supplied with an oxy-calcium light, afford a most perfect means of demonstration.

The value of the microscope, for medical as well as histological purposes, is amply illustrated during the course; and toward the close of the session, by the same means, students will have the opportunity of seeing the blood in circulation.

PHYSIOLOGY.

The course of Physiology comprises lectures on the structures, histo-chemistry and functions of the different organs of the body. The lectures will be illustrated by diagrams, prepared specimens, experiments and vivisections.

PATHOLOGICAL ANATOMY

Post-mortem examinations will be frequent during the course; and students will be afforded the opportunity of making the same under the superintendence of the Professors. Pathological Anatomy, in its special relations, will be taught by the respective Professors of the several practical branches.

MINOR AND OPERATIVE SURGERY.

The Professor of Surgical Anatomy will give special instructions in minor and operative surgery. He has entrusted the department of minor surgery to his assistants, while he will himself perform all the ordinary operations upon the cadaver, repeating them several times during the Course. These demonstrations will hereafter be given early in the Course.

PRINCIPLES AND PRACTICE OF MEDICINE.

The Professors of this branch will make it their endeavor to condense and simplify the subject, so as to adapt it to the ready comprehension of the student. To this end purely theoretical matters will be, to a great extent, excluded, and the Course will be devoted to the elucidation of fundamental principles, and to a concise system of their application.

CLINICAL MEDICINE.

The course of this branch is so conducted that the students are afforded abundant opportunities for the practice of auscultation and percussion; while the application of the microscope and chemical tests, as aids in the diagnosis of disease, is made in the lecture-room in all cases demanding their use. The use of the thermometer, and of the various forms of electricity, both as therapeutic and diagnostic agents, are demonstrated by the Professors of Clinical Medicine.

GYNÆCOLOGY.

This practical branch, which has of late years assumed such importance, is taught almost entirely by a system of Clinics. The unlimited resources at the command of Prof. Papin have already been alluded to. The class is divided into sections, and these sections attend his clinics in rotation. By this arrangement they soon become well acquainted with the appearance of the diseased organs, and the methods by which a correct diagnosis is made, and, being taught to handle instruments while assisting the Professor, they may acquire remarkable proficiency at the end of a full pupilage, both in diagnosis and treatment.

OBSTETRICS

Is taught in the didactic lectures of Prof. Maughs, and the mechanism of natural labor fully illustrated upon the manikin. Particular attention is paid to operative midwifery in all its different phases, and the more advanced students have opportunities to attend in person on such cases under the guidance of the Professor of this department.

MATERIA MEDICA AND THERAPEUTICS.

In this department attention is given to Hygiene, Dietetics, and those remedial agents which are not medicines proper, as well as to the ordinary drugs and medicines. Particular attention will be given to the physiological and therapeutical properties of remedial agents.

CHEMISTRY.

The course of lectures on Chemistry proper will be preceded by a number of lectures on that part of Natural Philosophy generally designated as Chemical Physics, illustrated by copious experiments and select modern apparatus. This enables students to understand chemistry much better than would be possible without such preparation.

Toward the close of the term several lectures will be devoted to pharmacy, pharmaceutical manipulations, and to the art of writing prescriptions.

OPHTHALMOLOGY.

This branch is taught clinically, thus enabling the general practitioner to obtain a practical knowledge (diagnostic and therapeutic) of the more common affections of the eye, which he will inevitably be called upon to treat, and to recognize the more intricate and dangerous ones requiring the skilled attention of the Ophthalmologist. This department is abundantly

illustrated at the ophthalmic clinics of the City and St. John's Hospitals, under the charge of Prof. Charles E. Michel, where students have an opportunity of examining for themselves, under the direction of the teacher, all of the various forms of disease and injury to which the eye is liable, and of witnessing a great variety of operations.

INSANITY AND NERVOUS DISEASES.

In addition to the unrivaled clinical advantages for the illustration of this interesting department of medicine, enumerated under the head of "Hospitals," Prof. Bauduy delivers a didactic course, in which the anatomy and physiology of the nervous system are taught with special reference to its pathology. The student being well grounded in these fundamental principles, is prepared to understand the succeeding lectures upon the more difficult and elaborate subjects of this course. There will also be conducted, weekly, at the City Hospital, by Prof. Bauduy, a clinic on Nervous Diseases.

SPRING AND SUMMER COURSE.

In the Spring and Summer Course the clinical advantages are in no way inferior to those of the regular term; while many subjects of the didactic course, not treated of during the Winter Term, have been selected for special consideration for this course. It begins immediately after the regular course, and continues nearly three months. Fee for the entire course \$20. This sum will be deducted from the fees of students attending the following regular Winter Course.

It is to be noted that attendance upon the regular Winter Session only is required of students, and that the Spring and Summer Session cannot be accepted in the place of one or the other of the two regular courses required for graduation.

The Faculty instituted the Preliminary and the Spring and Summer Course for the purpose of extending the time of study, although, as stated, leaving it optional with the student to take advantage of the same.

St. Louis being one of the four largest cities of the United States, it is evidently a great privilege to the industrious and ambitious student to have such an opportunity for uninterrupted work in the different branches of medicine, since only in a great city can there be ample facilities for *clinical instruction*, or the teaching of the symptoms and treatment of disease at the bedside. No practitioner of medicine will hesitate to affirm that the importance of the clinical method of instruction CANNOT BE OVERESTIMATED, and that the medical student should embrace every opportunity thus offered for gaining a PRACTICAL INSIGHT into the trying duties of his chosen calling.

OPTIONAL THREE-TERM COURSE.

The Faculty here repeat the suggestions made to students in their announcements for 1870-71, in regard to the extension of the time devoted to the study of medicine. Having experienced the difficulties the student meets with in his pursuit of the numerous departments of medicine, they earnestly advise a division of labor as the best mode of overcoming these obstacles, and of facilitating their acquisition of knowledge. With this view the Faculty recommend to such students who are willing to devote three years to college attendance, the adoption of the following curriculum of studies.

FIRST YEAR.

General and Descriptive Anatomy, Physiology, Histology, Chemistry, *Materia Medica* Dissections, and attendance on all the Clinics.

SECOND YEAR.

Theory and Practice of Medicine, Practice of Surgery, Obstetrics, Pathological Anatomy, Gynecology, Ophthalmology, Therapeutics, Dissections and attendance on all the Clinics.

THIRD YEAR

Attendance on *all* the Lectures, Dissections, and Clinics.

Students who pursue the above system of studies, may (if they desire) be examined at the end of the *first course*, on Anatomy, Histology, Physiology, and Chemistry.

At the end of the *second course*, on Materia Medica, Therapeutics, Gynecology, and Diseases of the Eye and Ear.

At the end of the *third or last course*, on Theory and Practice of Medicine, Practice of Surgery and Obstetrics.

Students who fail to pass the examination on any of the above branches at the end of the first or second courses, may be re-examined the following year, when, if they pass, such examination will be accepted as final.

LOCATION OF THE COLLEGE AND ST. JOHN'S HOSPITAL.

The college edifice is situated at the northeast corner of Christy avenue and Twenty-third street, and St. John's Hospital is immediately adjacent, on Twenty-third and Morgan streets. It is easily reached from the "Union Depot," by walking two squares west to Fourteenth street; there take the cars going north to Washington avenue; there take "Washington avenue" cars to Twenty-second street, where you are within one square of the College. As stated, the Janitor is always ready to conduct students to a boarding-house.

From the Iron Mountain Railroad Depot, walk up Plum street to Fourth; take a Fourth street car up to Washington avenue (or Olive street), and then as directed above.

Those who come into the city upon any of the railroads which cross the Mississippi river upon the bridge, will remember to get off at Washington avenue, before the train enters the tunnel, when they can take the Washington avenue cars, just above, as described.

It is easy to reach Washington avenue upon either the Fourth or Fifth street cars, from any of the depots, when it is only a ride of a few minutes to the College.

Immediately upon their arrival in the city, students should call upon the Janitor at the College, who will promptly assist them in procuring a boarding-house. They need not stop at a hotel at all, unless they prefer to do so. Boarding and lodging, with everything furnished, can be had convenient to the College and Hospitals, at from \$4 to \$5 per week.

REQUIREMENTS

OF THE

DEGREE OF DOCTOR OF MEDICINE.

1. The candidate must be twenty-one years of age, of good moral character, and must have been engaged in the study of medicine at least three years, including the courses of lectures.

2. He must have attended two full courses of lectures, the *last* of which *must* have been in this institution; the *first* may have been in some other respectable school. At and after the session of 1882-83, all applicants for the degree will be required to have taken three full courses of lectures, according to amended articles of American Medical College Association.

3. He must have attended the dissections and hospital clinics in this school as long as he was a student thereof.

4. He must write an acceptable Thesis on some subject connected with Medicine.

5. He must, by the 1st of February, notify the Dean, in writing, of his intention to become a candidate, and at the same time deliver to him his Thesis, together with the graduation fee, which, in case of withdrawal or rejection, shall be returned. He shall also furnish to the

Dean, at the same time, satisfactory evidence of having complied with all the preliminary requisites.

6. He must pass a satisfactory examination by the Faculty in all the branches taught in the College.

7. Graduates of other reputable schools, and who are candidates for the Ad Eundem Degree, will be expected to make application to the Dean at least one month before commencement, and must pass a satisfactory examination on all the branches taught in this School.

All graduates of less than three years' standing of other creditable schools, will be charged one-half rates. Those of over three years' standing will be required only to matriculate.

Graduates of this school may enjoy the privilege of attendance on the lectures and clinics free of charge.

Students may attend the lectures of one or more Professors, on paying the Matriculation Fee, and purchasing single tickets at \$8 each.

THE ASSOCIATION OF AMERICAN MEDICAL COLLEGES

Has been organized to meet the demand for reform in the matter of medical education. It cannot be denied that, just as all other organizations in society suffered some degree of disorder during the civil war, and have not yet altogether recovered, so the Medical Profession has been injuriously affected, and we can hope to effect a speedy and thorough reformation only through united and determined action; those who are not openly with us in such a cause, must expect to be regarded as indifferent or disaffected. The object of the Association being so necessary, and united effort so essential, it has received the general support of the Colleges, including the most powerful and influential, as will be seen by the list of members.

Only through the activity of such an association can the Profession hope to be freed from the nuisance of fraudulent diploma issues, from the entrance into its ranks of unqualified graduates, and from all the other many evils that flow from lawless exercises of high privileges that should be confined to well known and honorable institutions, but which legislatures notoriously grant to charlatans and worse. At the present time the Profession absolutely languishes under injuries for which no other remedy exists than an honest and determined co-operation among the respectable Colleges.

At the recent meeting of this Association held in New York, May 31, 1880, the articles in regard to requirements for graduation were so amended as to make it obligatory upon all Colleges belonging to the Association to demand that applicants for the degree of M. D. shall have studied three years, and have attended three full courses of lectures, said amendments to go into force at and after the session of 1882-83.
