SESSION 1892-93.

THE MISSOURI MEDICAL COLLEGE enters upon its FIFTY-SECOND Session with the three-years course of instruction thoroughly inaugurated, and with all the means for higher medical education well established.

The teaching force is large and experienced, and the facilities for acquiring a thoroughly practical and scientific medical education are unusually great. In connection with the school are fully equipped laboratories for elementary and advanced studies in chemistry, physiology, pathology and biology; two specially erected college buildings, containing four large lecture rooms, besides the necessary apartments for experimental work and for clinical and hospital work; two long-established and well-attended dispensaries; the material of four hospitals under contribution for bedside teaching; and an excellent museum rich in pathological specimens and in illustrations of comparative anatomy.

The plan of conveying instruction by recitation and by illustrative teaching has proved eminently successful, so that, as heretofore, clinical cases, specimens, casts, models, plates, etc., will be freely used to make plain the facts of scientific medicine.

The fifty-second regular course of lectures will commence Tuesday, September 27th, 1892, and, for the senior class will continue six months, for the junior and intermediate classes eight months. Commencement graduating exercises of the senior class will be held Tuesday, March 28th, 1893. The first and second years classes will continue their studies till May 30th, 1893. This increased length of term takes the place of the usual spring course.

Lectures and Clinics in the Post-Graduate School, open to physicians only, will begin April 4, 1893, and continue six weeks.

As heretofore announced, students matriculating for their first course of lectures during the coming session, will be required to attend three winter sessions before they can become candidates for graduation.

By a recent action of the State Board of Health of Missouri, it has now become a law in this State, similar to that which already exists in many of the neighboring states, that a three years college course of study will be required of those intending to practice medicine, and schools requiring less will not be recognized.

HOSPITAL CONNECTIONS.

At the College and Polyclinic Dispensaries the daily clinics held by the different members of the Faculty are supplied with a large number and rich variety of cases, for a tabulated statement of which see page 16.

St. John's Hospital is in charge of the order of Sisters of Mercy, and its medical management is exclusively controlled by the Faculty of the MISSOURI MEDICAL COLLEGE.

The Polyclinic Hospital contains a number of wards and private rooms, and is especially used for the reception of patients treated in the clinics; in this way interesting cases are not lost sight of, as is usual in dispensary practice, but are kept under observation for further study and care.

The St. Louis City Hospital is the largest hospital in the city. It contains four hundred and fifty beds, and is furnished with a commodious lecture and operating amphitheatre. The MISSOURI MEDICAL COLLEGE is represented in this institution by clinical teachers; and, inasmuch as it is the great receptacle for the pauper sick and injured of the city—several thousands being annually received into its wards and treated—the clinics held here are of the highest interest. Other hospitals with which members of the Faculty are connected are put under contribution for clinical instruction as interesting cases offer.

A Maternity Hospital has been established, which will be under the direct supervision of Professor Saunders, and which will be accessible to the students of this college. Diagnosing the puerperal state and practical experience in the technique of labor will be afforded the seniors in turn.

HOSPITAL APPOINTMENTS.

The Faculty would call the special attention of students to the fact that a corps of Assistant Physicians to the City Hospital are appointed each year, after a *competitive examination*, to which all members of the graduating class are eligible.

DIDACTIC LECTURES.

ANATOMY.—With a due appreciation of the importance of this fundamental branch of our science, the Professor of Anatomy, in addition to the cadaver, will freely use specimens, charts, drawings, etc., to illustrate his lectures, thereby facilitating the understanding of the subject matter, and making the lectures at once more comprehensive and interesting.

“Human Anatomy” is a distinct branch of the general subject of Anatomy, and is studied in our schools, both independently and in its relations to the collateral physical sciences. It will be the aim of the Professor of this department to combine in “Comparative Anatomy” (which includes every type of animal organization) as much as will aid in the better understanding of human anatomy, without rendering the subject more complicated.

PHYSIOLOGY.—The manifestation of life in its various forms, and the functions of the organs of the body in health, will be taught and demonstrated by the aid of diagrams, chemico-physiological experiments, and vivisection. In connection with the fundamental laws of the normal organism, the application of physiological facts to pathology and therapeutics will be pointed out.

CHEMISTRY.—In the first year that part of natural philosophy which is so closely interwoven with chemistry as to be often termed chemical physics, will form the introduction. Of chemistry proper the metalloids will be thoroughly studied. Frequent experiments will illustrate the lectures. In connection with the poisonous elements, the fundamental principles of toxicology will be discussed. Laboratory work will make the student practically familiar with the subjects taught in the didactic lectures. In the subsequent grades the chemistry of the metals will be taught, and a large portion of time given to organic chemistry and its relations to physiology and pathology. The experiments will be sufficiently diversified to illustrate the lectures, and an appropriately advanced laboratory course will enable students to become expert in such practical applications as the analysis of urine and examinations of physiological and pathological products. The collection of philosophical and chemical apparatus, models and specimens, already very complete, has been enlarged by purchase and donation. Among these a magnificent cabinet of essential oils and organic synthetic preparations, donated by Messrs. Schimmel & Co., of Leipsig, deserves especial mention.

MATERIA MEDICA AND THERAPEUTICS.—In this department attention is given to hygiene, dietetics, and those remedial agents which are not medicines proper, as well as the ordinary drugs and medicines. Particular attention will be given to the physiological and therapeutical properties of remedial agents, and their preparation and combination for administration.

PRINCIPLES AND PRACTICE OF MEDICINE.—The Professors of this branch will make it their endeavor to condense and simplify the subject, so as to adapt it to the ready comprehension of the student. To this end purely theoretical matters will be to a great extent excluded, and the course will be devoted to the elucidation of fundamental principles, and to a complete system of their application.

SURGERY.—The Professors of Surgery will give four lectures each week on the Principles and Practice of Surgery, and on Surgical Pathology. During the session all the ordinary surgical operations will be performed on the cadaver before the class.

OBSTETRICS.—The Professor of Obstetrics will lecture didactically to the intermediate and senior classes. The course will be made as practical as possible, especial attention being devoted to the mechanism of Labor, Hæmorrhage, Antisepsis, and the treatment of Septic conditions—and will be illustrated by recent charts, and manipulation upon the manikin.

ERUPTIVE FEVERS AND VACCINATION.—A thorough practical course on Eruptive Fevers will be given, especial stress being placed on the differential diagnosis. The important subject of Vaccination will receive full attention.

OPHTHALMOLOGY.—Didactic lectures on the anatomy and physiology of the eye, followed by the practical illustration of the use of the ophthalmoscope, will be given to the intermediate class.

OTOLOGY.—Didactic lectures appropriately illustrated, and clinical teaching for diagnosis and treatment will be the order of instruction in this department.

DISEASES OF THE NERVOUS SYSTEM.—The anatomy and physiology of the nervous system are taught with special reference to its pathology, and due consideration is given to those diseases most obscure and recently described.

MEDICAL JURISPRUDENCE.—There will be given a regular systematic course on Medical Jurisprudence, the object being to give some general directions for the guidance of the physician when engaged in medico-legal inquiries, or under examination in courts of law. Medical evidence in connection with cases of poisoning will be fully discussed.

OTHER INSTRUCTION.—In addition to the regular courses outlined above, the Faculty has arranged for various special lectures. For example, in the junior year Medical Terminology, Minor Surgery and Bandaging, and Normal Physical Explorations; and in the intermediate year a course in Accidents and Emergencies, in the Anatomy and Physiology of the Eye, Venereal Diseases, etc.

RECITATIONS from the text books are prominent features in the plan of instruction adopted by this College, and in the first years of the student's medical life the beneficial effects of this system cannot be overestimated.

CLINICAL INSTRUCTION.

MEDICAL CLINICS.—Professor Robinson will give one Clinical Lecture each week in the amphitheatre at the City Hospital during the entire collegiate year.

Professor Steer will give one Clinical Lecture each week in the College amphitheatre during the entire collegiate year.

Professor Glasgow will give Clinical Lectures on Diseases of the Chest at the Polyclinic each week during the entire session.

SURGICAL CLINICS.—Professor Tuholske will give Clinical Lectures each week in the amphitheatre at the City Hospital and at the Polyclinic during the entire session.

Professor Prewitt will give two Clinical Lectures each week in the College amphitheatre during the entire collegiate year.

GYNÆCOLOGICAL CLINIC.—Professor Engelmann will give Clinical Lectures at the Polyclinic each week during the entire session.

Clinical Professor Mooney will give practical instruction in Gynæcology at the large Clinic for Diseases of Women at the MISSOURI MEDICAL COLLEGE Dispensary.

The material for the Clinics of the Diseases of Women is abundant, placing unlimited resources at command for teaching this practical and important branch entirely by a system of clinics. The class is divided into sections, which attend the clinics in rotation. Each senior student in his turn makes digital and instrumental examinations of patients, under the direction and supervision of the professors.

OPHTHALMIC CLINIC.—Professor Michel will give Clinical Lectures in the College amphitheatre and at the Polyclinic each week during the entire session. Students will have an opportunity of examining for themselves, under the direction of the teacher, all the various forms of disease and injury to which the eye is liable, and of witnessing a great variety of operations.

AURAL CLINIC.—Professor Spencer will give Clinical Lectures at the Polyclinic each week during the entire session on Diseases of the Ear and Nose.

The course will be made as practical as possible. Models, anatomical preparations, and other necessary means of illustration will be used in the class room.

CLINIC ON DISEASES OF THE SKIN.—Professor Hardaway's instruction in this department will be made as practical as possible, as especial attention will be given to diagnosis and treatment. The Clinical Lectures will be illustrated by cases taken from the Dermatological Clinic, and by numerous colored drawings. Microscopical demonstrations of the anatomy of the skin, and of the vegetable and animal parasites infesting it, will receive attention during the course.

CLINIC ON DISEASES OF THE NERVOUS SYSTEM.—Professor Hermann will give Clinical Lectures each week during the entire session at the Polyclinic, in which electro-therapeutics will be fully illustrated.

Professor Bauduy will give Clinical Lectures from time to time on Diseases of the Nervous System at the College building.

LARYNGOLOGICAL CLINIC.—Professor Glasgow will give Clinical Lectures at the Polyclinic each week during the entire session. Instruction will be given in the use of instruments in this department.

ORTHOPEDIC SURGERY AND DISEASES OF THE JOINTS.—Professor Steele will give Clinical Lectures at the Polyclinic during the entire session. The use of Plaster of Paris in its manifold applications as an immediate dressing in the cure of joint diseases and deformities, and in the making of moulds and casts out of which to fashion leather and other more permanent splints, will be fully taught. Tenotomies and osteotomies will be done as required for the correction of deformities. The correct principles on which to make mechanical appliances for the treatment of joint disease and paralysis will be fully explained and illustrated on cases from dispensary, hospital and private practice.

OBSTETRIC CLINIC.—Professor Saunders will, at the Maternity Hospital, instruct the seniors in the signs of pregnancy and in the aids to be rendered the parturient female.

CHILDRENS CLINIC.—Professor Martin will give Clinical Lectures at the College Dispensary each week during the entire collegiate year.

DENTAL CLINIC.—Dr. Muetze will give Dental Clinics during the entire session.

St. Louis being one of the largest cities of the United States, it is evidently a great privilege to the industrious and ambitious student to have such an opportunity for uninterrupted work in the different industries and branches of medicine, since only in a *great city* can there be ample facilities for *clinical instruction*, or for the treatment of diseases at the bedside. No practitioner of medicine will hesitate to affirm that the importance of the clinical method of instruction CANNOT BE OVERESTIMATED, and that the medical student should embrace every opportunity thus offered for gaining a PRACTICAL INSIGHT into the trying duties of his chosen calling.

LABORATORY INSTRUCTION.

CHEMICAL LABORATORY.—The Chemical Laboratory contains a large number of tables with closets (to which the student carries the key), containing a full set of apparatus for the necessary work: blowpipe, flasks, funnels, porcelain dishes, wash bottles, platinum-foil and wire, scissors, files, stirring rods, test tubes, watch glasses, beakers, etc. Bunsen burners, supports, lavatories are conveniently placed. The reagents in great diversity are placed on shelves in easy reach. Burettes, pipettes, urinometers and other apparatus for advanced students are also supplied. For all these supplies, as well as for the necessary specimens for experimenting, *no extra charge* is made, only breakages of apparatus are expected to be made good. A sufficient amount of glass tubing is also furnished for practice in such glass-blowers work as will enable the student to make his own simple apparatus.

The graded instruction, distributed over several courses, will begin with the practice of chemical manipulations, and by easy steps teach the student the analysis of simple inorganic compounds; detection of the ingredients of chemicals unknown to him; some of the most important organic preparations; the principal methods of volumetric analysis; systematic investigation of the normal and abnormal constituents of urine, etc., etc. Especial attention will be paid to sanitary and to toxicological subjects, the inorganic poisons (arsenic, mercury, copper, etc.), as well as the organic poisons (oxalic and hydrocyanic acids, alkaloids, etc.). will be distributed among the specimens for study, and the examination of drinking water will be thoroughly practiced. So that the student will leave the institution competent to do his own work in those chemical operations which are so useful to the progressive practitioner.

HISTOLOGICAL LABORATORY.—This department has been fitted up with microscopes and accessories for a thorough course of work.

The first lessons will be devoted to a review of the principles of optics as applied to microscopical technology, structure and use of the microscope and accessories, etc. Then will follow the examination of fibres, starches and other common objects liable to be met with in microscopical work.

Instructions will be given in preparing sections, cutting, bleaching, staining, etc.; making the various styles of dry, transparent and opaque mounts; mounting in balsam and in glycerin and special media; drawing and measuring objects; determining magnifying power of simple and compound microscopes, etc.

The students will next take up, in a systematic manner, the study of histological specimens.

BIOLOGICAL LABORATORY.—The biological laboratory established by the faculty has proved a marked success. This year the advanced student will be thoroughly trained in the more practical work of pathology and bacteriology, including clinical microscopy. This department will deal only with pathological specimens, the normal being studied in the histological department. Lectures on pathology will be connected with the practical work of each day. A complete set of Koch's apparatus for the cultivation of bacteria has been procured for the use of those who are competent, and willing to engage in original research.

DISSECTION.

All students are expected to dissect; the Legislature of the State of Missouri passed (1887) an Anatomy Act, so framed as to give abundance of material for the study of Anatomy, and for the practice of Operative Surgery. Attention of students is particularly called to these great advantages. Anatomical material, therefore, will be plentiful, and furnished to the student at cost.

Two large dissecting rooms, well-ventilated and lighted, are under the direct supervision of the Professor of Anatomy.

Arrangements will be made for loaning students individual bones, which may be taken home for study, thus the better to perfect themselves in osteology.

PRELIMINARY EXAMINATION.

A thorough knowledge of the fundamental branches is required as a condition of admission to the regular Winter Course of Lectures. It should embrace the branches of a good English education, such as are taught in the public schools, namely: Arithmetic, Elementary Principles of Physics, and English Composition.

Applicants who are graduates of a literary or scientific college, academy or high school, or who have passed the entrance examination of a literary college in good standing; those who have a County or State teachers' certificate; graduates in medicine; and students taking lectures for a special purpose other than securing the degree, will be exempt from examination.

Applicants are advised to bring with them documentary proof of their preliminary education.

LOCATION OF THE COLLEGE BUILDINGS.

The College is situated at the northeast corner of Lucas Avenue and Twenty-second Street. It is easily reached from the Union Depot by walking two squares west to Fourteenth Street, there taking the street cars going north to Washington Avenue, then the Washington Avenue cars to Twenty-second Street, where you are within one square of the College.

Those who come into the city upon any of the railroads which cross the Mississippi River Bridge, will remember to get off at Main Street—before the train enters the tunnel—when they can take the Washington Avenue cars.

Immediately upon their arrival in the city, students should call upon the Janitor of the College, who will promptly assist them in procuring boarding-houses. Boarding and lodging can be had convenient to the College and Hospitals, at from \$4.00 to \$5.00 per week.

The new and commodious Polyclinic Building is on the corner of Lucas and Jefferson Avenues, a few steps west of the College Building. Its large dispensary, its hospital accommodations, its comfortable lecture and clinic rooms, are all appropriated exclusively for the benefit and convenience of the students of the College.

PRIZES.

Prizes will be offered to the junior and intermediate classes for the best dissections made during the term. For proficiency in Laboratory Work prizes will be offered by the Professor of Chemistry. The Professor of the Diseases of the Nervous System will offer prizes for thoroughness in his department. Honorable mention and record is also made of students obtaining high percentages for proficiency in Laboratory work.

COURSE OF INSTRUCTION.**FIRST YEAR.**

Didactic Lectures:—Anatomy, Physiology, Chemical Physics, Chemistry of Metalloids, Histology, Materia Medica, Pharmacy, Hygiene.

Practical Work:—Chemistry, Histology, Pharmacy, Bandaging, Dissections, Physical Examination of the Normal State in Health.

Clinics:—General Medicine, General Surgery.

Examinations:—At the end of this year examinations will be held in Osteology and Syndesmology, Histology, Materia Medica, Pharmacy and General Chemistry.

SECOND YEAR.

Didactic Lectures:—Anatomy, Physiology, Chemistry of Metals and Organic Compounds and Medical Chemistry, Practice of Medicine and Pathology, Principles and Practice of Surgery and Surgical Pathology, Obstetrics and Gynecology, Materia Medica and Therapeutics, Anatomy and Physiology of Special Organs.

Practical Work:—Medical Chemistry, Biology, Pathological Anatomy, Physical Diagnosis, Dissections, Histological Laboratory.

REQUIREMENTS FOR THE DEGREE OF DOCTOR OF MEDICINE.

1. The candidate must be twenty-one years of age and of good moral character.
2. He must have attended three full courses of lectures, the *last* of which must have been in this institution.
3. He must have attended the dissections for two years, and the clinics for three years.
4. He must by the 1st of March notify the Dean of his intention to become a candidate, and furnish at the same time satisfactory evidence of having complied with all the preliminary requisites.
5. He must pass a satisfactory examination by the Faculty.
6. Graduates of other regular medical colleges who wish to obtain a diploma of this institution, are required to attend the senior course of lectures and to pass a satisfactory examination. They must pay the matriculation fee and one-half the lecture fee of the third year.

The tickets and diplomas of irregular medical colleges will not be recognized.

No examination for degrees will take place before the close of the session.

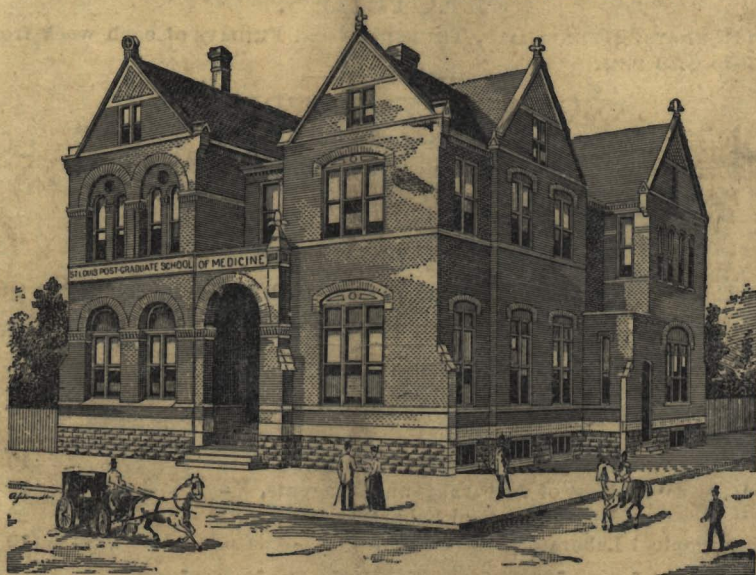
