

Dear Bob:

I am attempting to make plans for the return of Doctor Dezano Sobral to Rio de Janeiro during the coming summer. During the past two years Dr. Sobral has been a trainee supported under an NIH Training Grant in our laboratories here in the Department of Preventive Medicine. He has developed in a most promising way. Certainly he is an accomplished biochemist with an interest in adapting his knowledge and experience to clinical problems. His present appointment ends on June 30, 1964. I have asked for an extension of this appointment until August 31 so that he might complete a research project in which he is deeply involved.

On a recent visit to Rio de Janeiro I spoke to Doctor Clementino Fraga who is making plans for Dr. Sobral's appointment on a full-time basis. Apparently insufficient money is available at this time, but Dr. Fraga hopes to have it available by the time of Dr. Sobral's return. In addition, Dr. Fraga would afford laboratory space for Dr. Sobral in the Institute of Nutrition of which he is Director. If Dr. Sobral is to immediately resume and develop his research activities in Rio de Janeiro, he will require two items of equipment which are not now available. These are a Beckmann Spectrophotometer with power supply and a Farrand Photo-fluorometer. The approximate cost of these two items of equipment is \$4500. It seems to me very important to attempt to seek means of providing this assistance so that there will not be interruptions in Dr. Sobral's research interests and activities. I would therefore like to inquire whether the Rockefeller Foundation might be able to assist. It also would be my plan to aid Dr. Sobral in submission of an application for a NIH research grant for support of his research. I believe that he is now a fully qualified investigator. Such support could not be expected, however, in less

I believe it is very important for us to help Doctor Sobral and Dr. Fraga in making this adaptation. I firmly believe that this young man may make very important contributions to Brazilian medicine. There is already a large investment in him by the Rockefeller Foundation and by Washington University. I hope the Foundation will be able to assist us in securing the best possible opportunity for Dr. Sobral in Brazil.

Dear Scotty:

I enjoyed thoroughly the opportunity of having a little time with you in Atlantic City. It couldn't help but remind me how much we still miss you in St. Louis.

I am afraid that I did not state myself totally clearly in my letter of April 28th. The real needs for the Department of Preventive Medicine are in excess of the \$50,000 during a five year period. Actually our appraisal is to put the Department totally on its feet and to orient it completely to larger opportunities for the future, larger amounts of money are required. This could be very adequately accomplished with a grant of \$50,000 per year for a five year period and could be strongly supported if \$50,000 were available annually for a three year period. There is agreement within the school that the Department will be supported in its development, but funds are not available to accomplish this immediately. Our problem is critical and acute because we are at this time inadequately staffed to fully meet our teaching and other commitments. We believe that the Department has important other contributions to make but at this time we are unable to undertake these because of inadequacies of staff and space.

I hope that I have presented our problems clearly, but I would be willing to answer any questions which you may have or to make a trip to New York to discuss these problems more fully. I am sure also that Ed Dempsey will be willing to do these things for you also on his visit next Tuesday.



I am writing to inquire concerning the possible interest of the Rockefeller Foundation in assisting the Department of Preventive Medicine at Washington University in meeting new opportunities. As you will recall, I discussed this briefly with you in a recent telephone call.

The past ten years have been a period of reorientation and development of new roles for the Department within the School. The specific and noteworthy developments have included leadership by the Department of Preventive Medicine in establishing and carrying responsibility for the Coordinated Teaching Program, the securing of \$500,000 of endowment for the Department from the Danforth Foundation, the planning and construction of the new Wohl Clinic Building as a new and more appropriate setting for the Coordinated Outpatient Teaching Program, and the planning, staffing and initiation of a new comprehensive rehabilitation program which is housed in the new Irene Walter Johnson Institute of Rehabilitation. It is our belief that the Department has through these activities contributed importantly to the development of the teaching and research interests of the School.

The commitments resulting from this expansion of interests of the Department have brought new problems which must be resolved at an early date or it will be impossible for it to carry its present responsibilities or develop in any other way. One major need for staffing remains in the general area of epidemiology.

In an effort to permit this development, we have already secured a grant of \$15,000 annually for five years from the Danforth Foundation to apply on the salary of a new staff member in epidemiology.

The problems which currently exist and stand in the way of the Department continuing to carry its obligations or to develop in any further way are the need for two additional staff members and for additional space for laboratories and offices. The space need would be met by doubling the space occupied by the Department on the second floor of the old Clinic Building. Costs of rehabilitating this space could be met by the University if other support were available for the continuing needs of the Department during a three to five year period. I would, therefore, like to request consideration by the Foundation of our request for support in the amount of \$50,000 for five years. With this support we would proceed to develop the staff to meet its existing obligations in a more effective way and to add a unit in epidemiology. During the course of the five year period as space became available we would add three additional staff members, one of these with support of the Danforth Foundation grant. At the end of this time the Department would be in a position to carry on without outside support.

I make this appeal because our needs are imminent and critical. Without this assistance we can only look forward to retrenchment and ineffective utilization of the opportunities which have very generously been made available to us by the Medical School.


