ANNOUNCEMENT.

THE thirteenth annual course of instruction in the St. Louis Post-Graduate School of Medicine will commence Monday, March 25, 1895, and continue six weeks, closing Saturday, May 4, 1895.

This school is better equipped than ever before for thorough clinical teaching in all the departments of medicine and surgery. Since the issuance of the last annual Announcement, an additional college building has been erected immediately south of and adjoining the commodious Polyclinic building, by which greatly increased facilities for practical laboratory work in pathology, bacteriology, chemistry, microscopy and anatomy will be afforded the students attending the post-graduate course. Here are convenient lecture halls, rooms for general and special dispensary work, reading rooms, with late medical periodicals, light and airy dissecting rooms for anatomical study and surgical operations on the cadaver; altogether making the equipment as complete as architecture and the demands of instruction could suggest for the convenience and comfort of the student. A second building, also, has been erected adjoining St. John's Hospital, containing convenient amphitheater and clinic rooms for general and special dispensary work; all under the exclusive control of the faculty of this school.

Two dispensaries and four hospitals offer a great variety of interesting material, especially rich in surgical cases. Reference to the tabulated report of the dispensary work for the past year, as seen on page 9 of this Announcement, and which shows a grand total of 14,496 cases treated and 1,030 operations performed, gives a practical idea of the amount and nature of the clinical material brought under contribution for study, and this is exclusive of the medical and surgical services at the various municipal and private hospitals open to the staff of the Post-Graduate School.

The special branches of medicine and surgery are taught clinically; that is, by actual demonstration and operation on the patients so abundantly supplied by the dispensaries and hospitals under the management of the school. These various advantages unite in making this course most desirable for the busy practitioner who wishes to review under competent guidance the best practice of to-day.

This institution, being intended for graduates only, does not clash in its objects or interests with those colleges whose instruction terminates with the graduation of the student. It rather supplements them, commencing where they leave off, affording the student an

opportunity to test practically, under efficient instructors, the teachings and theories already received.

The matriculants are limited to regular graduates in medicine.

THE FEE for the entire course, including all the departments, is \$75.00; for any single professor, \$25.00.

CERTIFICATE OF ATTENDANCE will be issued at the close of the session to those who desire on the payment of \$5.00.

Physicians on arriving in the city will at once report to Dr. Henry Muetze, the Resident Physician, who will assist them in procuring desirable boarding places, which can be had from \$4.00 to \$5.00, or more, per week.

DEPARTMENTS.

GENERAL MEDICINE AND THERAPEUTICS.

Professor P. G. Robinson, M. D.

Professor Glasgow and Assistant Professor Hersman will give clinical lectures weekly at the City Hospital and at the Polyclinic Hospital, on general medical diseases, especially those of the heart and lungs. Professor Steer will hold weekly clinics at the college dispensary and at St. John's Hospital, on general medicine and therapeutics. The instruction will embrace the diagnosis and treatment of disease, with accurate observation and significance of symptoms. The therapeutic action of remedies and the comparative value of medicines, especially of the newer drugs, will be dwelt upon. Members of the class will be asked to make diagnoses, and the conversational method will be adopted as opportunity admits.

GENERAL AND ORTHOPEDIC SURGERY.

Professor T. F. PREWITT, M. D. Professor A. J. STEELE, M. D. E. B. KENNER, M. D. PHIL. HOFFMANN, M. D.

Professor Prewitt will give two clinical lectures each week at the college dispensary and at St. John's Hospital, on general surgery. Professor Tuholske will hold clinics on general surgery and genitourinary surgery, at the City Hospital and at the Polyclinic Hospital, several times each week. Professor Steele will give clinical lectures during the entire session at the Polyclinic, on orthopedic surgery and diseases of the joints.

From these different sources material will be drawn covering the whole field of general surgery. The antiseptic method, in its minute details, will be illustrated, and the technique of operations will be carefully given. Members of the class will be afforded opportunity to assist in the practical details of operative work, thus familiarizing themselves with the use of modern surgical appliances.

In deformities and diseases of the joints, the use of plaster of Paris in its manifold applications as an immediate dressing in the cure of joint diseases and deformities, and in the making of moulds and casts out of which to fashion leather and other more permanent splints, will be fully taught. Tenotomies and osteotomies will be done as required for the correction of deformities. The correct principles on which to make mechanical appliances for the treatment of joint diseases and paralysis will be fully explained and illustrated on cases from dispensary, hospital and private practice.

DISEASES OF THE NERVOUS SYSTEM, AND ELECTROTHERAPEUTICS.

Professor Bauduy will give a course of lectures on obscure and recently described affections of the nervous system, with occasional illustrative cases. Professor H. W. Hermann will meet the class at the Polyclinic and City Hospitals, illustrating from a vast number of cases the various forms and types of psychology and neurology. Electro-therapeutics will be made clear by the daily use of galvanism in the treatment of patients.

DISEASES OF THE EYE.

Professor Michel will select interesting and rare cases of eye disease from the two large clinics of the Post-Graduate School and the St. John's Hospital, to illustrate the various forms of ophthalmic affections, the class being permitted to examine individually the same, as well as witness all the operations performed.

DISEASES OF THE SKIN.

Professor W. A. Hardaway, M. D. Ass't Professor C. F. Hersman, M. D. A. N. Lyon, M. D. J. S. Wallace, M. D.

Professor Hardaway will give practical instruction on the diagnosis and treatment of cutaneous affections; and the clinical lectures will be abundantly illustrated from the ample material furnished at the Polyclinic and St. John's dispensaries. Microscopical demonstrations of the anatomy of the skin, and of the vegetable and animal parasites infesting it, will receive attention during the course.

DISEASES OF THE EAR.

Professor H. N. Spencer, M. D. Clinical Professor D. C. Gamble, M. D. A. G. Enderle, M. D. M. A. Goldstein, M. D.

Professor Spencer and Clinical Professor Gamble will give two clinics a week. Instruction will be of the most practical character. The anatomy of the ear will be exemplified on preparations and models. Attention will be paid to the methods of examining the ear, the use of instruments, and therapeutic applications in treatment. Diseases of the nose will be included in this department.

DISEASES OF WOMEN.

Professor G. J. Engelmann, M. D. Clinical Professor F. D. Mooney, M. D. Clinical Professor F. C. Ameiss, M. D. F. A. Temm, M. D.

Clinical Professor Mooney will give weekly clinics on gynecology, at the College and St. John's dispensaries, where a large clientele furnishes abundant means for illustrating this important department.

Clinical Professor Ameiss will, at the well-attended clinic at the Post-Graduate building, afford opportunity for the practical study of diseases of women; and attention will especially be directed to that class of cases which are most frequently observed in family practice, and the technique of such minor operations as are most generally performed by the physician.

DISEASES OF THE THROAT AND LARYNX.

Professor W. C. Glasgow, M. D.
L. C. Boisliniere, M. D.
P. Carr Lane, M. D.

Professor Glasgow will demonstrate the affections of the throat and larynx, and illustrate methods of local treatment. Students will be drilled in the use of the laryngoscope.

SPECIAL PHYSIOLOGY AND MICROSCOPICAL TECHNOLOGY.

Professor H. M. WHELPLEY, M. D. A. N. LYON, M. D.

Professor Whelpley will give instructions in microscopical technology. It is a lamentable fact that a large proportion of the physicians who own microscopes are ignorant of the principles on which the instrument is constructed and the methods of using to advantage this valuable aid in the diagnosis of disease. Thus it is that thousands of microscopes are growing dusty in idleness, when they should be rendering substantial aid to busy practitioners.

A consideration of the optical and mechanical parts of the micro-

scope will be followed by practical instruction in handling the instrument and accessories. The students will have an opportunity of becoming familiar with the work by aid of that impressive teacher—experience. Students having microscopes are invited to bring them to the college, for the purpose of having them examined and their value determined. The college has a large microscopical laboratory, equipped with valuable modern microscopes, of which the students will have free use.

Professor Whelpley will devote a portion of his course to the consideration of those physiological facts, based on recent investigations, which are of importance to the busy practitioner.

MIDWIFERY.

Professor W. Hutson Ford, M. D. Professor E. W. Saunders, M. D. Assistant Professor W. S. Barker, M. D.

Professor Ford will lecture on the differential diagnosis of pregnancy, ectopic gestation, the treatment of difficult labor, puerperal emergencies, obstetrical antisepsis, thrombosis and embolism, turning and the use of the forceps.

Professor Saunders will afford students an opportunity of attending cases of labor at the Maternity Hospital, when each student will be expected to make a diagnosis of the case, and watch the progress of it by repeated examinations. The subject of antiseptics in midwifery will be specially emphasised, and all other subjects necessary to the successful conducting of labor will be presented.

ANALYTICAL CHEMISTRY.

Professor Chas. O. Curtman, M. D. W. C. Teichman, Ph. D.

Professor Curtman will give a course on the analysis of urine, partly didactic, copiously illustrated by experiments and demonstrations, and partly by laboratory work. The didactic lectures will embrace the minute anatomy of the kidney, the description of the physical and chemical properties of the normal and abnormal constituents of urine, and the methods for qualitative and quantitative analysis. In the laboratory the most improved modern methods of detecting and estimating the quantity of urea, uric acid, chlorides, phosphates, glucose, albumen, etc., will be taught and thoroughly practiced by the class.

DISEASES OF CHILDREN.

Professor E. W. Saunders, M. D. Clin. Prof. T. A. Martin, M. D. Ass't Prof. W. S. Barker, M. D. Frank Heitzig, M. D. W. W. Robertson, M. D.

Professor Saunders will hold a clinic every Monday afternoon,

from among the thirty or forty babies at the Foundling Home, where the student will have ample opportunity for observing the various diseases of infancy and the effect of treatment.

Special attention will be given to the subject of infant feeding, and the analysis and preparation of the various infant foods.

Assistant Professor Barker will hold autopsies in cases of death, and also drill each student in the use of the O'Dwyer's apparatus for intubation, until he can perform the operation with ease on the infant cadaver.

Clinical Professor Martin will hold weekly clinics at the College Dispensary on the diseases of childhood.

OPERATIVE SURGERY.

Professor Brokaw will give a practical course on the cadaver. Special attention will be given to the technique of abdominal and pelvic surgery. Demonstrations of intestinal anastomoses and other operations will be made during the course.

Owing to the liberal Anatomical Act of the State of Missouri, abundant material is placed at the disposal of the medical institutions; so that opportunity will be afforded the physicians in attendance of performing all the typical and atypical operations of modern surgery.

BACTERIOLOGY AND PATHOLOGY.

H. A. L. Rohlfing, M. D.
M. A. Goldstein, M. D.

This department of the college has been supplied recently with an abundance of microscopes, bacteriological apparatus and other instruments for scientific research. Attention will be given to the care and preparation of pathological specimens, and physicians will receive careful instruction in all the details of microscopical diagnosis in its clinical relations, such, for example, as the examination of sputum, urine, tumors, etc. A full consideration will be given to the application of antitoxines in diphtheria and other diseases.

MEDICAL JURISPRUDENCE.

Professor Selden P. Spencer, LL. B. Professor J. K. Bauduy, M. D.

A course of lectures on this interesting and important topic will be given by Professor Spencer, who will consider those subjects in which the two great sciences of medicine and law have a common interest.

DENTAL AND ORAL SURGERY.

Arrangements will be made for clinical instruction in this department to those students who wish to give attention to it.
