# About the Library

## About

Washington University School of Medicine and its teaching hospitals make up a complex organization on the vanguard of biomedical research, patient care, public health and educating the next generation of professionals. Becker Library provides resources and services to help all of our faculty, staff and students accomplish their goals. We seek opportunities to assist people by giving them the tools, information, training and connections to enable, improve or accelerate their work.

## Mission

Becker Medical Library's mission is to provide a haven for study and scholarly reflection along with the resources, information and expertise to deliver innovative support for advancing discovery, lifelong learning and improving human health.

## Vision

In the pursuit of its mission Becker Medical Library:

- Commits to personal, timely and professional service
- Ensures that it maintains a world-class collection of information resources, accessible anytime and anywhere
- Engages faculty, students and staff to ensure that library resources and services keep up with their changing needs
- Aligns the library's strategic initiatives in support of school priorities
- Adopts technology solutions to extend access to and maximize the impact of library resources and services
- Strives to demonstrate the value of medical libraries and define their future role within academic health sciences centers

Becker Library fulfills its mission in many ways. It provides access to a truly world-class collection of scholarly journals, special collections, databases and clinical information resources. It also provides space and services to enrich the learning, research and patient care activities of the school.

Becker Library connects people to the resources—experts, core facilities, training, journals, search strategies, databases, and more—that they need to be successful. Through these activities, Becker Library fosters collaboration and builds communities around common interests.

# Divisions of the Library

## Collection Management Services

At the library's core is its extensive collection of journals, books and databases, where nearly all the current resources are available online. The Collection Management Services (CMS) Division is responsible for procuring, organizing, cataloging, managing and providing access to Becker Library's information resources for students, faculty, staff and other patrons.

Among CMS's accomplishments during FY18, the most notable are:

- Analyzed off-site bound journal collection and made the difficult decision to discard nearly 600 boxes of print journals
- Tracked article requests for stored print materials from medical school patrons, identifying approximately 300 requests for FY18, most filled by inter-library loan
- Secured the compact shelving in anticipation of losing the security gates at the library's entrance due to planned renovations—this project required shifting volumes within compact shelving to accommodate the necessary installation work, as well as moving vulnerable items from stacks shelving into compact shelving
- Weeded the audio and video collection in anticipation of the renovation of the circulation desk—nearly 1,200 compact disks (CDs) and digital video disks (DVDs) accompanying books were reinserted into their respective volumes
- Managed the elimination of individual paid Ovid accounts to prepare for IP-based access to Ovid databases and journals

## Health Information Services

The Health Information Services (HIS) Division encompasses the circulation and physical management of the library's collection as well as information services specific to the delivery of health information in support of patient care and clinical research. HIS staff are active participants in patient care, teaching, and research through activities like clinical rounding in our partner hospitals, evidence-based medicine, literature searching, instruction within the MD, PT, and OT programs, and systematic review services and support. During FY18, HIS made a significant impact in the areas of education, patient care and research.

Becker Library has continued to strengthen its partnership with the Office of Medical Student Education with the goal of training students to become life-long learners. Each year, librarians provide evidence-based medicine instruction to students within the Practice of Medicine course. This year the session was reformatted into a small group exercise that facilitated interactive learning. A post-course survey provided valuable student feedback that will help librarians refine elements of the instruction for the coming year.

In response to student feedback, Becker Library evaluated and adopted a policy to allow students to use the library 24 hours a day, seven days a week. Staff worked with the Office of Facilities Management and Protective Services to create procedures and mechanisms for allowing after-hours access. Becker

Library now provides an around-the-clock option for students looking for a safe, quiet place to study.

Pediatric Emergency Medicine Research Associates' Program (PEMRAP) offers Washington University undergraduate students interested in pursuing a career in medicine or allied healthcare field an opportunity to participate in clinical, patient-oriented research projects at St. Louis Children's Hospital. For the past five years, Becker librarians have provided instruction to PEMRAP students to enable completion of program projects. FY18 included a library tour with a visit to Becker Library's Archives and Rare Books, which was a "big hit" with students.

FY18 marked Becker Library's first partnership with the Division of Biology and Biomedical Sciences (DBBS) summer program, BioMedRAP, which recruits exceptional undergraduate students interested in careers in biological and biomedical sciences for a 10-week lab experience culminating in an independent research project. Early in the summer program, Becker librarians provide a hands-on database-searching and citation-management session for 30 students. This Becker Library-DBBS collaboration lays the foundation for a future core-skills course for doctoral students.

Since 2012, Becker librarians have been part of an Institute for Public Health course, Systematic Reviews and Meta-Analysis, where they provide an overview of the systematic review process then consult with and provide expert searching skills for students completing systematic reviews. This year a Becker librarian also lectured in a Clinical Investigation Program course, Foundation of Healthcare Research, where evidence-based medicine elements were taught with an emphasis on critical appraisal of study methodologies within the literature.

In FY18 a Becker librarian served as co-instructor in a Teaching Physician Pathway project, comparing peer-teaching to faculty-led teaching during a third-year medical student ambulatory medicine rotation. The peer-teaching cohorts were given a self-directed learning assignment with a librarian-created grading rubric. A librarian then provided information-seeking skills feedback to each student.

In partnership with Emergency Medicine faculty, a Becker librarian created web portal for residents and medical students providing required resources during their Emergency Medicine rotations.

Now in its third year, the clinical rounding service continued to increase time spent on the medical units. Four librarians participated in interprofessional medical teaching rounds for a total of 30 hours. The service became more structured with librarians gaining access to the rounding schedule, receiving training to understand patient presentations and implementing standardized point-of-care tools.

Becker librarians are national leaders in systematic review literature searches. For the second year in a row, Becker Library offered a two-day systematic review workshop which attracted librarians from across the U.S. and Canada and received excellent reviews from participants.

In collaboration with the Office of Medical Student Education (OMSE), Becker librarians peer-reviewed a Best Evidence in Medical Education (BEME) Collaborative systematic review proposal. The School of Medicine is a BEME Collaborating Center with OMSE faculty on the BEME board.

A Becker librarian is a long-time participant in the Office of Diversity, Equity and Inclusion's Saturday Scholars program, which provides a forum for 16 local public high school students to learn about human anatomy in both lecture and lab environments while interacting with medical students.

## Translational Research Support

The Translational Research Support (TRS) Division provides specialized expertise, customized programs and services, and unique information resources to support Washington University's broader goals of connecting basic research to patient care and community health.

The Clinical and Translational Science Award program, funded by the National Center for Advancing Translational Sciences, a part of the National Institutes of Health, is designed to increase the efficiency and speed of clinical and translational research on the local, regional and national levels. Awarded a Clinical and Translational Science Award in 2007, Washington University established the Institute of Clinical and Translational Sciences (ICTS) to assist in the creation and sustaining of interdisciplinary research collaborations and help move research findings from the initial discovery phase into new diagnostics, therapeutics and prevention strategies to improve human health.

Becker Library created the Translational Research Support Division in 2008 to bring together library programs and initiatives that support and complement the goals of the over 1,400 ICTS members and the greater Washington University research community. Demand for TRS services continues to grow as researchers benefit from Becker librarians' expertise in navigating this new and multifaceted area.

The TRS Division encompasses three key aspects of translational research services: science support, community outreach and scholarly communications. The science support program provides instruction, consultation and support for specialized software and databases for the genomic and basic science research community. The community outreach and health communication program fosters health literacy by partnering with School of Medicine and medical center groups to improve the communication skills of clinicians, researchers and students, and enhance creation and delivery of reliable and credible health information. The scholarly communications and research analytics program supports authors and researchers on a wide range of issues including publishing options, public access mandates, copyright and author rights, assessment of research impact and dissemination of research findings.

## Archives and Rare Books

Becker Library's Archives and Rare Books Division houses one of the nation's finest collections of historical materials and serves as a continuing resource to visiting scholars and the public. Since 1912, Becker has maintained several collections of rare medical texts devoted to scholarship and teaching. The collections' strengths include ophthalmology, neurology, anatomy, otorhinolaryngology, dentistry, obstetrics and gynecology.

The archival collections document the history and development of Washington University's School of Medicine and its affiliated hospitals and research institutions. These collections include administrative records of the school's departments, programs and affiliated institutions, as well as faculty papers, photographs, artifacts and oral histories. Archival and rare book items are regularly exhibited in the Glaser Gallery and on request.
