# About the Library

## About

Washington University School of Medicine and its teaching hospitals make up a complex organization on the vanguard of biomedical research, patient care, public health and educating the next generation of professionals. Becker Library provides resources and services to help all of our faculty, staff and students accomplish their goals. We seek opportunities to assist people by giving them the tools, information, training and connections to enable, improve or accelerate their work.

## Mission

Becker Medical Library's mission is to provide a haven for study and scholarly reflection along with the resources, information and expertise to deliver innovative support for advancing discovery, lifelong learning and improving human health.

## Vision

In the pursuit of its mission Becker Medical Library:

- Commits to personal, timely and professional service.
- Fosters a culture that embraces the principles of diversity and inclusion.
- Ensures that it maintains a world-class collection of information resources, accessible anytime and anywhere.
- Engages faculty, students and staff to ensure that library resources and services keep up with their changing needs.
- Aligns the library's strategic initiatives in support of school priorities.
- Adopts technology solutions to extend access to and maximize the impact of library resources and services.
- Strives to demonstrate the value of medical libraries and define their future role within academic health sciences centers.

Becker Library fulfills its mission in many ways. It provides access to a truly world-class collection of scholarly journals, special collections, databases and clinical information resources. It also provides space and services to enrich the learning, research and patient care activities of the school.

Becker Library connects people to the resources—experts, core facilities, training, journals, search strategies, databases, and more—that they need to be successful. Through these activities, Becker Library fosters collaboration and builds communities around common interests.

# Divisions of the Library

## Collection Management Services

At the library's core is its extensive collection of journals, books and databases, where nearly all the current resources are available online. The Collection Management Services (CMS) Division is responsible for procuring, organizing, cataloging, managing and providing access to Becker Library's information resources for students, faculty, staff and other patrons.

Among CMS's accomplishments during FY19, the most notable are:

- Assisted with creating the new Feuerstein Health and Wellness Information Center, adding 140 new books to the library's collection.
- Purchased and cataloged 263 new print books and added 17,983 new e-books to the collection. Of these, 15 books and e-books filled purchase suggestions from users.
- Maintained access to 8,732 electronic journal titles and subscribed to 22 additional electronic resources.
- Reviewed publisher and vendor contracts to confirm that there is university-wide access for journal subscriptions. (Some e-books and databases remain restricted to the medical school only.)
- Selected 210 titles of the most heavily used print journals for permanent retention. Unpacked, inventoried and shelved journals retrieved from storage. Foundational classics such as JAMA, Brain, The British Medical Journal, The Lancet and The New England Journal of Medicine were among the 3,485 volumes restored to the library. An additional 11,657 volumes (183 titles) are now at Olin Library on the Danforth Campus, where they are accessible for use.
- Sent 954 articles from our own collection to School of Medicine users through the document delivery service.
- Borrowed 1,529 items for School of Medicine users from other libraries through interlibrary loan.
- Supplied 5,441 articles and 85 monographs to other institutions as outgoing interlibrary loans.

## Data and Research Computing

The Data and Research Computing (DRC) Division was created in the fall of 2018 to provide a broad range of educational programs and services in support of the research activities of the School of Medicine's faculty, staff, and students. Specifically, the group provides introductory training in biomedical research computing (R, Python, cluster computing, MATLAB), delivers educational offerings and programs in the areas of data management, data sharing, and data reuse, and supports awareness, access, and education on a variety of software tools for biomedical data analysis and visualization.

DRC has strong partnerships with the Center for High Performance Computing and the Institute for Informatics, and has growing collaborations with University Libraries and the Research Infrastructure Services group within Washington University Information Technology, accelerating progress on strategic initiatives shared across these groups. These synergistic relationships help the university maximize return on institutional investments in research computing and data management in response to the evolving needs of biomedical researchers.

During FY19, the new DRC Division provided essential and innovative services:

- Presented 21 research computing workshops, attended by 707 faculty, staff, students and trainees.
- Hired a new senior support scientist to provide training and services in the areas of data management and sharing in partnership with the Institute for Informatics. New educational offerings and support programs will roll out in FY20.
- Facilitated discounted, bulk licensing on nine research software tools, including 185 licenses to labs and 1,331 to individuals.

## Health Information Services

The Health Information Services (HIS) Division encompasses the circulation and physical management of the library's collection as well as information services specific to the delivery of health information in support of patient care and clinical research. HIS staff are active participants in patient care, teaching, and research through activities like clinical rounding in our partner hospitals, evidence-based medicine, literature searching, instruction within the medical doctor, physical therapy, and occupational therapy programs, and systematic review services and support.

During FY19, HIS made a significant impact in the areas of education, patient care and research:

- Participated in teaching rounds at both Barnes-Jewish Hospital and St. Louis Children's Hospital, providing services that save physicians' time.
- Spent over 1,000 hours completing 97 reviews during the fiscal year.
- Presented the fourth annual offering of "Designing Search Strategies for Systematic Reviews," a two-day workshop designed to instruct librarians about best methods and practices for creating reproducible systematic review search strategies. Sixteen medical librarians from around the United States and Canada attended and gave very positive course feedback.
- Provided curriculum on licensing, evidence-based practice, taxonomies, info-button technology and clinical information resources as part of a library rotation in the Institute for Informatics' Clinical Informatics Fellowship Program.
- Created an easy-to-use web guide ([beckerguides.wustl.edu/dbbs](http://beckerguides.wustl.edu/dbbs)) for faculty and students in the Division of Biology & Biomedical Sciences (DBBS). The portal is an ongoing, collaborative effort between DBBS and Becker Library to meet DBBS faculty's need for a practical, sustainable method for curating education resources.

## Research, Publishing and Communication

The Research, Publishing and Communication (RPC) Division provides specialized expertise, customized programs and services, and unique information resources to support Washington University's broader goals of connecting basic research to patient care and community health. The division provides scholarly publishing services, including author and publishing support, research analytics and impact evaluation, as well as health literacy and communication services for clinicians and researchers. It is also responsible for the information technology that supports the library's resources and services, and maintains Digital Commons@Becker, the institutional repository for the School of Medicine.

The RPC Division made substantial contributions to the medical school's mission in FY19:

- Implemented and launched a pilot faculty profile and research information platform called Profiles at Washington University School of Medicine in collaboration with the Institute of Clinical and Translational Sciences and the School of Medicine Office of the Dean.
- Opened the Feuerstein Health and Wellness Information Center, a campus resource on the library's first floor providing access to printed and electronic health information and promoting programs and campus events on wellness and healthy living to benefit staff, students and faculty.
- Continued the #SciComm Thursdays series for a second year, providing presentations to over 100 attendees on a wide variety of topics including visual communication techniques, designing prevention messages for the public, communicating genetic test results and promoting work through social media.
- Provided case studies for the Translational Science Benefits Model website, which launched in January 2019, as part of the Institute of Clinical and Translational Sciences Tracking and Evaluation Team.
- Processed over 1,500 requests for information at the St. Louis Children's Hospital Center for Families Resource Library.

## Archives and Rare Books

Becker Library's Archives and Rare Books Division (ARB) houses one of the nation's finest collections of historical materials and serves as a continuing resource to visiting scholars and the public. Since 1912, Becker has maintained several collections of rare medical texts devoted to scholarship and teaching. The collections' strengths include ophthalmology, neurology, anatomy, otorhinolaryngology, dentistry, obstetrics and gynecology.

The archival collections document the history and development of Washington University's School of Medicine and its affiliated hospitals and research institutions. These collections include administrative records of the school's departments, programs and affiliated institutions, as well as faculty papers, photographs, artifacts and oral histories. Archival and rare book items are regularly exhibited in the Glaser Gallery and on request.

In FY19, ARB staff stewarded and shared the collections in the following ways:

- Received 2,074 item requests from patrons.
- Acquired one monograph and six pamphlets for the rare book collections, and added 32 accessions to the archives.
- Awarded two travel scholarships to help researchers living over 1,000 miles away access the collections. Of note, Jaipreet Viridi, professor of history at the University of Delaware, came to research the Hallowell Davis Collection and Central Institute for the Deaf Collection in preparation for her book on hearing impairment research programs.
- Prepared data for migration into new archives management software, Access to Memory, which will allow users to more easily identify and access the archival collections.
- Started a well-attended monthly series, First Fridays @ Becker, where items from the archives and rare books collections following a specific theme are displayed for the public in an informal show-and-tell.
